How has COVID-19 changed your life? A fellow publisher asked that question last month. He asked all of us attending an on-line meeting. I started making a list and then gave up because the list was getting too long. Nevertheless, I found the question helpful because it made me think. Just where is God in all of this? That is a tough question to answer.

On the one hand, as I looked at my list, I realized that most changes are on the external level. For example, I see less of my family members in person. In fact, a couple who are quarantined because they are in nursing care, cannot have visitors. At Franciscan Media these days, most of our staff are working from home and handling their responsibilities via the internet and Zoom meetings.

In our churches and chapels, there are less people than normal, even as public Mass schedules resume. I presume many folks have decided that it is too risky for them.

The same is true for our Kolping meetings. Nobody should be faulted for the decisions that they make to protect their own safety and that of others.

Please give thought to taking care of your own health and safety. For example, it is an act of charity to wear a face mask in stores and shops that are open because you are trying to care for the health and safety of others. Currently, with the resurgence of cases, governors and health professionals are ordering masks in public. It might be a good time to schedule a look at *Matricula* over the days/weeks as we are home following our governor's and county health officials' guidelines. Just like your kids and grandkids, it is time for "home study". There are no live Kolping Genealogy sessions, but we will be reviewing Matricula on Sunday, August 16.

Matricula (data.matricula-online.eu). covered this site in a previous live session but it is so good, it needs another examination. Take some time accessing Roman Catholic records. Matricula is a nonprofit organization that made its mark by digitizing Catholic Church records from the old Austro-Hungarian Empire. Among records, you'll find Catholic registers from Münster and Paderborn, as well as the German Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. Unique to this site is the large collection of Roman Militärkirchenbücher, Catholic the parishes" of garrisoned soldiers who were often far from home.

Matricula has a language "flipper" that translates the home page into English, but some pages, the originals, are, of course, in German only. Prepare <u>your</u> research before this online meeting at 2:00 pm on August 16, and maybe another attendee can translate for you.

# Schützenfest is moving to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Weekend in June (Father's Day Weekend)

Dear Fellow Kolping Members -

I am very excited to announce that the Kolping Board has approved the moving of *Schützenfest*, *America's Oldest German Fest - Seit 1866*, to the 3<sup>rd</sup> weekend in June, starting in 2021!!! *Schützenfest* 2021 will be held from **June 18 - 20**.

If I were to try and distill this decision down to a word, it would be WEATHER. It has been proven from personal experience and, moreover, by studying weather charts, that the 3<sup>rd</sup> weekend in July is historically the worst weekend of the year to host a festival in Cincinnati. The main reason for this is the oppressive humidity which builds up in July and hits a sustained peak around July 18. The combination of sustained humidity and high heat is a festival's arch enemy, as it either causes people not to come out or for festivalgoers to go home early. Furthermore, this combination almost always generates huge thunderstorms and unstable weather. Additionally, oppressive humidity and high heat is unsafe and very taxing on our volunteers before, during, and after the festival!

Weather is a huge factor in whether a festival is financially successful. To help highlight this fact, over the past 8 years of being directly involved in the leadership of *Schützenfest* and this year's Kolping Picnic, we experienced quality weather the entire weekend only one time (in 2016). When I compare that one good year's attendance to 2019's, I see that we had nearly double the number of people coming in 2016.

We are not naïve enough to think that we will be guaranteed great weather the 3<sup>rd</sup> weekend in June each year, especially here in Cincinnati. However, based on a detailed study of historical weather charts and discussions with meteorologists, the 3<sup>rd</sup> weekend in June gives us a greater probability for better weather. Ultimately, we are playing the odds.

One of the exciting aspects of the 3rd weekend in June is the ability to honor fathers on Father's Day on Sunday. We initially thought that celebrating *Schützenfest* over Father's Day weekend was a show stopper. However, the more we talked with members, traditional festivalgoers, and most importantly fathers, the clearer it was that being able to feature Father's Day at *Schützenfest* is a great advantage. Generally speaking, fathers want a fun place to go to celebrate their special day!

We will create special promotions and fun ways to feature fathers at *Schützenfest*! For example, on Sunday, fathers will get in free and be invited to take part in our traditional parades. One added bonus to hosting *Schützenfest* over Father's Day weekend is it will be easy for festivalgoers to remember each year! Our goal is to have *Schützenfest* as the 'go to' destination for fathers and families on Father's Day.

I want to emphasize that this decision was not made easily. Rather, we took a great amount of time, care, thought, analysis, and gathering of various people's and members' input and opinions before making this recommendation to the Kolping Board. We realize this change will be difficult for some. We also realize that it will be challenging to find volunteers on Sunday. At the same time, Kolping has been blessed recently with several new members that we have the opportunity to tap into for help and support.

Ultimately, we feel it is in Kolping's best financial interest to move *Schützenfest* to a weekend that traditionally has better weather. *Schützenfest* is Kolping's major fundraiser of the year and fundamental to our Society's financial stability.

We look forward to everyone's support of this difficult decision and we look forward to your continued support in the years ahead!

By the way, 2021 is a special year, as we will celebrate the 155th Anniversary of Cincinnati's 1st Schützenfest!!!


## Kolping History Corner

#### The Kolping Drama Club

Excerpts from "Making a Difference: A History of the Catholic Kolping Society of Cincinnati"

Many subgroups of the Cincinnati Kolping Society have come and gone over the years, one of which was the Kolping Drama Club, or Theater-Abteilung. This subgroup was established by Henry Fellerhoff, one of the founders of Cincinnati Kolping, on December 27, 1931, and already on January 31, 1932, the club put on a play in the St. Francis Auditorium called, "Wenn Du Noch Eine Mutter Hast" ("If You Still Have a Mother"). This performance, along with performances by the Kolping Choir and the Kolping Orchestra, drew close to 700 people. The play was a huge success.

On the heels of their successful debut, the members of the Kolping Drama Club then had to start rehearsals for their performance of the comical farce, "Robert and Bertram" at the Cincinnati Kolping Eighth Anniversary celebration in October of the same year. This again was met with rave reviews. A review written in the *Cincinnati Freie Presse*, a German language newspaper, stated, "It was by far the best amateur performance that Cincinnati had experienced in the last ten years."

The Kolping Drama Club performed again at the Kolping Christmas party in December of 1932, and then started rehearsals for their next play, "Die Tochter des Verbannten (The Daughter of the Exile)", which they performed in February of 1933 at St. Francis Hall. As before, a critic from the *Cincinnati Freie Presse* gave a glowing review, which in part stated, "In spite of the bad weather, the large hall of St. Francis School was filled nearly to capacity by a crowd who gave thunderous applause for the extensive program ... The evidence can be shown, without exaggeration, that the theater evening was one of the best that had been offered here to the German public in years."

The Kolping Drama Club remained active, at least until February of 1936, when they were still mentioned as a subgroup. Other plays that were mentioned were two one-act plays that were performed on November 12, 1933, under the direction of Reverend Dr. Robert Hammer, the Vice Praeses of Cincinnati Kolping, and an author in his own right. The two plays were titled, "Das schwarze Haar (The Black Hair)" and "Die Tante aus Krähwinkle (The Aunt from the Backwater)".

It seems that the Drama Club became inactive sometime after February of 1936, but then was revived again in time for the fifteenth anniversary celebration of Cincinnati Kolping on November 19, 1939, when they performed the one-act play, "Die beiden Brüder (Both Brothers)". The play was directed by Henry Fellerhoff.

No mention of the Drama Club was made after that, as its demise was most likely a result of the low profile the German immigrants had to keep during World War II. This subgroup of Cincinnati Kolping was yet another example of the many talents of its members and their contribution to the diverse cultural scene of Greater Cincinnati.
