Note from Fr. Dan, Our Praeses

Today is Memorial Day, but traditional ceremonies and parades are cancelled due to COVID-19. I find myself thinking about all that our Kolping family has lost. First it was the Fish Fries, even after the drive-thru effort; Mass and ceremonies for the feast of St. Joseph and wedding anniversaries; Seniors monthly meetings, spring sports programs, all regular meetings; then our annual *Schützenfest*; even the national convention in September. Memorial Day brings a lot of things to mind this year, not just the many people who died during the nation's wars. Above all, I find myself thinking and praying for the victims of COVID-19. Consider the thirty-eight million who have lost their jobs, kids who are closed out of schools, graduation ceremonies cancelled, and families disrupted. More than 100,000 Americans lost their lives already. There will be more. Recall also the more than one and a half million who have been infected in countries around the world where there are vastly limited medical services. Very, very sad, especially because the end is not yet in sight.

Where is God in all of this? We have no answer. All we can do is hold steady in our faith and work to serve those in need. Plagues and pandemics were the occasions that gave rise to growth in prayer and faith in the history of God's people. Many saints found their calling as they served those who were victims. I find myself inspired by the witness of those in the medical professions who are serving the victims of COVID-19 at risk to themselves. I feel saddened because elderly victims are quarantined and separated from their families and from the sacraments. Yet, in all this suffering and sacrifice God is truly present, calling all of us to grow in our faith.

We must keep our hearts open to how the Lord is calling us all, as members of the Kolping family, to live our faith today. Let us pray for one another every day.

Kolping History Corner

The Cincinnati Kolping House on Republic Street

Excerpts from "Making a Difference: A History of the Catholic Kolping Society of Cincinnati"

After establishing the Catholic Kolping Society of Cincinnati in 1924 and subsequently leasing property along the Little Miami River for a Kolping Camp, the members turned their attention to purchasing a Kolping House for the Society. In April of 1929, the Kolping Society's law firm started inquiring about the purchase of a former police station and bath house on Republic Street in Over-the-Rhine. Through the tireless efforts of the law firm and Father Ripperger, the Kolping Praeses, the house was officially purchased at the end of January, 1930. After extensive renovations, the Cincinnati Kolping House was formally dedicated on August 3, 1930, at which time a great celebration and open house was held. In the words of one of the members in an article in the *Kolping Banner* in September 1930, "In the annals of the history of the Cincinnati Kolping Society, the third of August, 1930 will forever shine with golden letters. It brought the realization of the most ardent wish of the Cincinnati Kolping family, the opening and inauguration of our own home, our newly renovated Kolping House." The house included a fest hall, kitchen, dining hall, club room and 28 bedrooms, offering a place to sleep for 38 people.

The opening of the Kolping House brought new life into the Society and it became the center of activity for all the members. Many of the men boarded there when they first came from Germany until a point in time when they could get on their feet and get a place of their own.

Each year, there would be several Communion Sundays; there were religious and educational lectures, family evenings, dance events, excursions and theater evenings. The Kolping Ladies Auxiliary was founded on August 9, 1930, and the women immediately started raising funds with numerous card parties and dance events. They were also instrumental in giving a woman's touch to the Kolping House, with curtains, table cloths, etc., and they helped out in whatever way they could.

The Kolping House was the pride and joy of Cincinnati Kolping and it continued to be the center of activity for the members until the membership rolls grew too large for the house to accommodate events for the members. A proposal to sell the Kolping House on Republic Street was made to the members in February of 1958. The house had served them well since 1930, but the neighborhood had deteriorated and had become unsafe. The house was sold and officially transferred on May 29, 1958. An era had passed. Then in July of 1958, construction began on a new club house at Kolping Grove on Winton Road, which was completed by the members and dedicated on January 15, 1959.


The building that housed the Cincinnati Kolping Society for so many years still exists today at 1523 Republic Street in the newly refurbished Over-the-Rhine district of Cincinnati. The building was renovated in 2016, and there are now four condos on the upper two floors and a business on the first floor. The Kolping motto, "Gott segne das ehrbare Handwerk" (God bless our honorable work) still shows above the front door.


