Kolping Convention Postponed

The Cincinnati Kolping Board, as well as the National Kolping President and Administrator, have approved postponing the National Kolping Convention until September of 2022. Based on the uncertainty of COVID-19 restrictions being lifted by September of this year, the demographics of the participants in the event, the state of all of the U.S. Kolping societies with very little income coming in, and a slew of other factors, the Convention Committee decided that it would be in the best interest of all concerned to postpone until next year.

The National Convention will now take place the weekend of September 9-11, 2022 in Cincinnati. The safety and well-being of all of the Kolping members was our utmost concern in making this decision to postpone. Since the National Kolping Convention is normally scheduled every two years, this fits nicely into the rotation, since the last convention was in 2018.

We will be sending out new information about the convention either late this year or at the beginning of next year, so stay tuned!

Message from Fr. Dan, Our Praeses

Kolping Genealogy

Sometimes the Good Lord leads us into new directions during the events of our lives. The life of blessed Adolph Kolping offers an example for us today.

From his youth, Kolping was very interested in learning. In fact, even as a young priest he aspired to becoming a university professor. As he later wrote, there was a time when he thought he could learn about life from books and absorb all wisdom from them. But after he had studied for the priesthood, even at the university he said: "Quite a few people around me were definitely more learned than I was and yet they didn't read as much as I did. They were better informed about life and knew how to judge not only ordinary, but often important matters, much better. They hit the nail on the head much sooner than I could, despite all my book learning." [quotes are from Christian Feldmann's biography—*Adolf Kolping: toward a Christian Society.*]

Fr. Kolping realized that people he once despised were often more religious than their teachers. He realized that the tradesmen and artisans were a storehouse of "the richest physical and moral strength" and of "simple common sense." Kolping converted from being an academic scholar to a clear-headed, down to earth practical man. From a social climber "out of the scum of the earth", he realized these things through experience. That was why he dedicated himself to his pastoral mission and focused so much on building up the Gesellenverein of tradesmen who were losing out to the economics of industrialization and mass production.

What is so impressive to me is how he kept learning from the people whom he served as a pastoral leader. He did what he realized was needed for the common good and giving up on his earlier academic ambitions.

During this time of COVID-19 and all the partisan politics of 2020, it is good if all of us can contribute some time to strengthening our faith and our sense of hope by prayer and quiet reflection on what the Lord is trying to tell us. That is my advice and prayer for all our Kolping family today.

What ship? What port did my ancestor depart from? To what port did my ancestor arrive? How long was the voyage? Who accompanied my ancestor? These are some questions we hope to answer on March 21 when we cover *Passenger Lists and Immigration*.

We will look at major European departure ports. Southern and western Germans tended to emigrate through the ports of Bremen or Le Havre. Northern and eastern Germans tended to leave through Hamburg.

- Hamburg became the most important emigration port in Germany by 1900. Between 1830 and 1914, more than four million people left Europe via Hamburg. By 1914, more than one million Eastern European Jews had immigrated to the United States through the port of Hamburg.
- More than 4 million Germans arrived in the United States between 1850 and 1897 through the ports of Baltimore, Boston, New Orleans, New York, and Philadelphia.
- The major ports of entry were New York, Baltimore, Boston, Philadelphia and New Orleans. Records of these ports and other minor ports are available too.

We can locate much information on our ancestors once we research these records. German Immigration records may include: first name(s), last name, birth year, year of arrival, occupation, country of origin, city or town of last residence, port of arrival, destination, travel compartment, port of departure, date of arrival, ship's name. But we will have a particular focus on the German Emigration Center at Bremerhaven.
