A shiny coin and a lump coin were both mine.



History of the Kolping Fall Festival

Now that we are discontinuing our Winefest and replacing it with a "Harvest Festival", it is interesting to take a look at the history of both of these festivals.

In digging in the Kolping archives, the first mention of a "Herbstfest", or "Fall Festival", was in 1938. This festival took place at the Kolping Camp on the Little Miami River on August 28th. A flyer for this festival is below. The Fall Festival was held on and off throughout the years, being included in the Kolping annual events at Kolping Grove at Muehlenhardt Farm and the new Kolping Grove on Winton Road.

Then in 1970, the Society decided to discontinue the festival, and it was replaced with a dinner dance on the first Saturday of November. The Kolping men chaired the event for two years, and then it was taken over by the Kolping Ladies Auxiliary in 1972, at which time it was called the Winefest.

The Winefest continued for over 40 years through 2016, and during most of that time, it was chaired by Gert Schroeder. Gert's signature Rouladen dinner was served at the fest, along with a bottle of wine for each couple, and everyone danced the night away to various bands throughout the years. Thank you, Gert, for your dedicated service for all those years, and also to the many, many people who worked at the Winefest!

Now, what goes around, comes around, and the time has come to begin a new festival – the Harvest Fest!




